Welcome Our New Minister, Rev. Masanari Yamagishi

Hawaii Betsuin has a new associate minister! Reverend Masanari Yamagishi, most recently the resident minister of Buddhist Church of Lodi in California, has just begun a fourmonth assignment at Hawaii Betsuin

Reverend Yamagishi's home town is Takaoka, Japan, a coastal city of Toyama Prefecture on Honshu Island. He is the third son in a temple family (no sisters), and his eldest brother now serves as head minister of the home temple. "Yamagishi" literally means mountain seashore — fitting for Takaoka and Hawaii both, where mountains meet the sea!



After receiving Tokudo ordination at age 18, Rev. Yamagishi enrolled in Ryukoku University, graduating in 2001. For a time after graduation, he worked in Japan at a company that provides benefits for public school teachers. He then joined Hon

President's Message from Dexter Mar Building Healthy Sanghas – Resilience

In 1889, just as the first Hongwanji minister arrived in the Sandwich Isles, an influenza pandemic began in Central Asia. In 1900, just as the newly built Hongwanji Honolulu temple was about to open, a bubonic plague outbreak led to the Great Honolulu Chinatown Fire and the emergency use of the new temple as a temporary shelter. In 1918, just after the grand opening of the stunningly beautiful Pali Highway Betsuin temple, the epic Spanish flu pandemic began. In 1956, two years after Betsuin's major main building expansion, the Asian flu pandemic started. Today, we again face a deadly virus and again we will recover

and live gratefully as we have for 130 years.

We often hear folks say "I can't believe it! I've never seen it this bad!" Historically, most events HAVE happened before, it's just that some haven't remembered and learned the lessons of past events.

Those who learn the lessons, act diligently, and survive, will recover and move on with our precious lives. Your Betsuin Board leadership has continued business and spiritual operations. We are paying our bills and payroll, with-

out interruptions or layoffs. We are applying for federal support funds and working on recovery options for postponed/cancelled fundraising events. The



Hongwanji Mission School continues via a "remote learning" program.

We are confident that the Betsuin will end the year on budget and back in full operation.

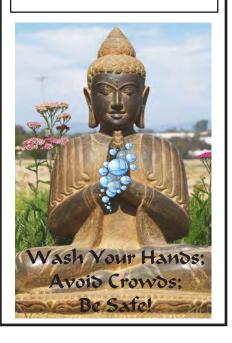

Recipe from the BWA

RECIPE: TUNA TOFU BAKE (from the kitchen of Irene Ida)

20 oz. firm tofu, drained
1 can water packed tuna, drained
1/2 cup water chestnuts, chopped
1/2 cup green onion
1/2 cup carrots, grated
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 eggs, beaten
2 T. shoyu
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
parsley

1-4 oz. can mushrooms (stems and pieces) or 4 oz. shiitake

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine ingredients and put into 8x8 baking pan. Bake for 35 minutes. Garnish with parsley.

Saying the Name is in itself mindfulness; mindfulness is nembutsu: nembutsu is Namo-amida-butsu.
