

JULY AND AUGUST OBON MONTHS Every seventh month of the year, Japan celebrates Obon. It is one of their biggest holiday seasons. What is Obon? It is time to remember and show gratitude for those who have passed before us. Families who celebrate Obon usually gather in their hometowns, visit the family graves, and attend festivals. But, not all families follow the same customs.

The true history of bon dance origins is not clear, but it has over a 500-year history in Buddhist traditions. The legend is that long ago a disciple of Buddha had a vision of his dead mother. She was trapped in a place of Hungry Ghosts. It was certainly not a place for her to be. He made offerings of food and drinks and freed his mother from the hell. When she was released, he was overjoyed and danced, and that was the beginning of the Bon Dance.

After cancelling their bon dance celebrations for three years, many temples, including the Hawaii Betsuin, are once again, holding Bon dances! It's a joyous time, so please join in with your yukata, kimono, or happi coat and dance up a storm! Many of our friends and relatives have passed away during the three years the bon dances were cancelled, so let's join in the festivities, now, and let's recite the Nembutsu, "Namo Amida Butsu", in gratitude!

HEALTH ISSUES: WAYS THAT CAN HELP PREVENT LUNG DISEASE


- 1. Don't smoke. If there are children, give up your smoking.
