#### Meet Rev. Shingo Furusawa



We are pleased to have as our 2015 Eitaikyo guest speaker, Rev. Shingo Furusawa. Rev. Furusawa was born on May 17, 1978 in Hiroshima, Japan. He entered Ryukoku University in April 1998 and graduated in March 2002. His major was Buddhist History. He entered Ryukoku University Graduate School (Master Course) in April 2002 and graduated in March 2004. His major was Jodo Shinshu. He entered Ryukoku University Graduate School (Doctorate Course) in April 2004. His major was Jodo Shinshu.

Rev. Furusawa moved to Hawaii as a minister of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii on November 10, 2006. After the orientation at the Hongwanji Headquarters in Honolulu, he worked at Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin from February 2007 to

October 2008, so many of you probably remember him. He then worked at Pearl City Hongwanji from October 2008 to August 2010.

Rev. Furusawa received a scholarship from Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for the period from August 2010 to 2011, and studied at the Institute Buddhist Studies, Berkeley California. He also studied English and Public Speaking at the Berkeley City College. From August 2011 to June 2014, Rev. Furusawa worked at Hilo Betsuin. Since June 2014, Rev. Furusawa has worked at the Honokaa, Kamuela, Kohala, and Paauilo Hongwanji Temples.

Honpa Hongwanji Misssion of Hawaii started in April of this year. The five members are taking classes in the following areas: 1) Life and basic teaching of Sakyamuni Buddha, 2) the Pure Land sutras, 3) the teachings of the Seven Pure Land Masters, 4) Life and teaching of Shinran Shonin, 5) Jodo Shin teachings, 6) History of Hongwanji and 7) Structure of the Hongwanji. I am in charge of these classes, which are held on Fridays. Rev. Yuika Hasebe is the instructor for liturgy and general etiquette. Memorization of Japanese words is involved in this study. The candidates will continue their training until early December.

Originally meaning to "cross the stream of suffering to the other shore of Enlightenment," the term Tokudo signifies ordination. It is the first step to become a Hongwanji minister. After getting ordained, one has to get a Kyoshi certificate, which is required to become a full-fledged minister of the Hongwanji. A few years of official study of Jodo Shinshu at a school like

IBS at Berkeley is needed before going for the Kyoshi program at Honzan.



The committed candidates of the Pre-Tokudo program are Sherman Thompson, Barbara Brennan, and Charlene Kihara of Hawaii Betsuin. There are two Moiliili Hongwanji members, Kerry Kiyohara and Raymond Takiuye, Jr. They have their own local temple training once a week at Moiliili Hongwanji.

If approved as Pre-Tokudo Training candidates at the December State Sessions, they will take part in the tenday Tokudo sessions and ceremony at Honzan next year. And most of them are planning to continue to study Jodo Shin Buddhism for the Kyoshi certificate.

Indeed, it is encouraging and heartwarming for me and other Betsuin ministers to see these members who are highly motivated to serve the Hongwanji as ministerial staff in the future.

Before I came to Hawaii, I had a girlfriend. She was beautiful. When we were dating, you may

guess I was happy. That is not so; I was super happy. I had my hair styled, I tried on various clothes and looked at myself in the mirror saying "this is not OK.... maybe this is it..." finally, I was ready for my date and I was about to leave my house, but returned to the mirror and once again checked my hair and clothing. Usually, I arrived at the place where we were to meet 10 minutes earlier than the scheduled time. When I arrived there, can you guess what I did? I looked around and if I found the mirror or window, I checked my hair style and clothes again. Even during the date, every time I found the mirror, I tried to

check my hair style and clothes. Finally, my girlfriend said, "Excuse me, you are dating, not with yourself in the mirror, but with ME." Her words brought me back to the present and I realized that I was dating this beautiful girl! Why did I check my hair style and clothes and not look at her! She was there for me! How stupid was that?

This bitter-sweet memory taught me a lesson. That is when we are busy looking only at ourselves, we cannot see the most beautiful things even when they are in front of our eyes.

In the same way, if we so strongly have our "I, my, me, mine" mind, we cannot see and feel the Dharma which is always, always guiding us. We may get angry, sad and frustrated when things don't go as we wish. In those moments, unfortunately, our hearts and minds are not calm and gentle. The "I, my, me, mine" mind shows our limitations. We

cannot be perfect. Rather, we are perfectly imperfect. However, once we are awakened to the Buddha's perfect and ultimate wisdom and compassion, then we realize that our lives are totally embraced by Buddha's wish and it enables us to live our lives with gratitude.

We have the same number of hours each day, but the way we live is different. Buddhism teaches us the way to live our lives meaningfully. Our "I, my, me, mine" mind are transformed into kind, gentle and beautiful hearts and minds. Buddha's voice is calling to not everybody. Buddha's voice is calling to only each of us. Let us hear the Buddha's voice.

With an attitude of gratitude, let us appreciate each moment and what we have now. Then, that attitude will lead our lives to a more meaningful way of life. Namo Amida Butsu

## **African Sangha**

Did you know that in Kenya, East Africa, where President Obama's father came from, there is a Jodo Shinshu Mission. In the year 2010, the Puna Hongwanji Newsletter had an article written by Akira Yamamoto, who is the brother of Terry Fujioka, one of our Betsuin and BWA members. In the article he refers to the late Reverend Norito Nagao as the source of information. The Reverend Nagao was an older brother to the late Michiko Hori, another staunch BWA member, who recently passed away. I shall quote the passages that Akira had written. "From 1994 to 1997 the late Reverend Norito Nagao of Kurtistown had

been in touch with Mrs. Kemunto Osaka of the Jodo Shinshu Mission in Kenya, East Africa (Kenya is almost the size of Texas). She was so happy that Reverend Nagao of Papaikou Hongwanji was sending some financial help and photos and publications from Hawaii. There are some 20 small groups of Buddhists that have great faith in Amida Buddha, Shinran Shonin, message of nembutsu and reciting Namu Amida Butsu. When she first received a certified bank check of \$50.00 from Hawaii, she was filled with excitement. They also received \$500.00 from Hongwanji International Center, Japan and were curious about such a large amount being sent. It was a great relief as they are con-

stantly short of funds for the mission.. Most of the Africans are farmers and are very poor.

"The busses there are very irregular, costly and usually full so most of them walk many miles to the village to attend the service. The leaders wish they had a bicycle or motorcycle to cover the many villages. They have built a two-room Shinshu Hospital to see pregnant women, treat all kinds of disease, snake bites, malaria, etc. There is one woman clinical official who works tirelessly. More work needs to be done to the clinic but there are no funds. Mrs. Osaka is telling her husband to sell part of their farmland to fund the hospital. Other farmers have also sold part of their precious farmland to support the mission.

"There have been times when the Christian local church leaders printed zealous anti-Buddhist literature, and mobs have disrupted their meetings, calling them devils. But a local district officer from the government who visited the center recently said, "What a beautiful Shinshu Mission center."

"They must build more shelters but they do not have any resources. The membership keeps increasing so they must all make tremendous sacrifices and work harder for the mission. Honpa Hongwanji invited Mrs. Osaka to Hawaii in 1995 but she was not able to get a visa from USA."

It would be interesting to research and see how wide spread Jodo Shinshu has grown in Kenya and in other parts of the world.

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# Life Is Water contributed by Sharyn Sekine

How many folks do you know who say they don't want to drink anything before going to bed because they'll have to get up during the night? Something else I didn't know...I asked my doctor why do people need to urinate so much at night time?

Answer from my Cardiac doctor: Gravity holds water in the lower part of your body when you are upright. (legs swell). When you lie down and the lower body (legs, etc.) is level with the kidneys, it is then that the kidneys remove the water because it is easier.

I knew you need your minimum water to help flush the toxins out of your body, but this was news to me.

Correct time to drink water. Very Important, from a Cardiac Specialist! Drinking water at a certain time maximizes its effectiveness on the body.

- 2 glasses of water after waking up helps activate internal organs.
- 1 glass of water 30 minutes before a meal\*\*\*helps digestion
- 1 glass of water before taking a bath helps lower blood pressure.
- 1 glass of water before going to bed\*\*avoids stroke or heart attack.

Water at bedtime will also help prevent night time leg cramps. Your leg muscles are seeking hydration when they cramp and wake you up with a Charlie Horse.

# Betsuin Offers New Classes in the Hawaiian Language for Beginning and Advanced Students with Kumu Alison Ledward

Hawaii Betsuin announces two new classes in the Hawaiian Language, taught by Kumu Alison Ledward: (1) A beginner's class, starting on Tuesday, January 12, 2016, will be conducted in 8-week cycles and meet in the dining room from 7:00 pm to 8:00 pm. The class will include pronunciation and building of vocabulary with application of the vocabulary to develop listening, reading, and speaking skills. There will be a lot of class oral drills. The classes are low stress, and the students will dictate the pace of study.

There is no homework and no testing. Taping of the classes in any form will not be allowed. (2) An advanced class started on Tuesday, Oct. 29, 2015, in the dining room from 5:30 to 7:00 pm. There will be three 15-week cycles per calendar year. The advanced class increases/expands the basic knowledge, using different resources [old newspaper articles, stories, songs, etc] to help students develop their language skills. The advanced class is open to anyone having one year of high school Hawaiian or one semester of college-level Hawaiian language. Registration is through the Hawaii Betsuin office.

## Boy Scout Camp Ho'omaluhia


