Bodhi Day is the day we express our appreciation and joy to Shakyamuni Buddha. Shakyamuni Buddha was the founder of all Buddhist traditions, so all Buddhist sects, not only our Jodo Shinshu sect celebrate this day to commemorate Shakyamuni Buddha's attainment of Enlightenment.

In our tradition, we have two major Buddhas. One is Amida Buddha and the other is Shakyamuni Buddha. Many people are a little confused about the difference between those two Buddhas. Amida Buddha's image is in the Hawaii Betsuin main temple altar. Amida did not historically exist in this world. On the other hand, Shakyamuni Buddha, who was a regular human being, lived about 2500 years ago. He was a prince of the Shakya clan in India, and his original name was Siddhartha Gautama. He left his castle at the age of 29 to find the way to solve people's sufferings. On the dawn of December 8, at the age of 35, Siddhartha Gautama reached Enlightenment as he sat under the Bodhi tree. He then became a Buddha: the Awakened One.

So, what is the relationship between those two Buddhas? It is written in the Larger Sutra. One day, Shakyamuni Buddha gave a sermon to monks and nuns at Vulture Peak. The content of his sermon was Amida Buddha who is a Buddha who provides comfort and benefit to all sentient beings. Shakyamuni Buddha explained to those monks and nuns about Amida Buddha's nature and Vows. There was a king named Dharmakara. King Dharmakara wanted to save everybody from sufferings and thought thoroughly about how to get it done. After a lengthy time of consideration and establishment of Vows to save all, Dharmakara be-

came Amida Buddha. This is the story Shakyamuni Buddha told the monks and nuns to let them realize about the Truth: Amida Buddha.

Those two Buddhas are both very important to our tradition. Amida Buddha is the one who always embraces us, removes suffering, and gives joy. But without Shakyamuni Buddha, we may not have been able to encounter Amida Buddha whose Great Compassion and Wisdom embraces us always. On this occasion of Bodhi Day, let us together express our appreciation to Shakyamuni Buddha who guided us to the Truth and who introduced Amida Buddha to this world.

Dharma Message: "Bodhi Day"

This month, we will remember an event in the history of mankind. This event happened to a human being, like you and me.

It was not the usual kind of thing that is noticed by history; it was not the winning of a great military battle or a war, nor was it the shaking of the earth in some natural disaster or the passing of a comet or some such thing.

As a matter of fact, as human events go, had not some people been able to recognize the significance of this event, it probably would have gone by completely unnoticed.

If the young man, whose name was Siddhartha Gautama, had not spoken up about what had happened to him,

no one would have known. No one would have known about Siddhartha's awakening to Enlightenment. The Wheel of Dharma would not have been turned, meaning that we would not have become aware of the teachings of the Enlightened One.

It is often said that Siddhartha "attained" or "achieved" Enlightenment as if it were something to conquer, but I think it would be better to use the statement of Dogen Zenji, founder of Soto Zen, who said it was more a case of "the Dharma attaining Siddhartha." Siddhartha was able to subdue his ego long enough to receive the Dharma freely, and from that instant, he was immersed in it. Siddhartha did not achieve or create or conquer anything, but he did gain insight into something that had always existed and always will exist, and he would later teach, the Dharma of Enlightenment.

In Rev. Nobuo Haneda's publication Dharma Breeze" (vol. IV-1, Mar 2000) in an article entitled "What is Amida Buddha?" he speculates about the last meditation that Siddhartha entered under the Bodhi tree before entering Enlightenment. He writes this: "Although he had studied various doctrines and practiced under them, he found that they could not lead him to the ultimate peace he was seeking. Thus, having travelled from the Princely life to that of an ascetic to the very edge of his life, he sat under a tree. With firm determination, he said to himself, 'Never shall I stir from this seat until I have attained the most perfect awakening.' Then he started to meditate."

"In his meditation Siddhartha asked, 'What am I? Do I have anything permanent in myself?' He examined his body, things such as his skin, muscles, bones, and blood. He also examined his mind, things such as sensation, conception, volition, and consciousness. Then he realized that everything in his body and mind was constantly changing and flowing, and there was nothing permanent."

There, Siddhartha was confronted with the reality of existence, impermanence. Of course, this was not his only insight



into the Dharma, but it appears that Dr. Haneda seems to think it was one of his most important insights.

When we look at impermanence it speaks to Siddhartha's observations of birth, sickness, old age, and death. Siddartha realized early on the sufferings of human existence. He further realized that his Mother, Father, Wife, Son, and he, himself, would also experience these sufferings, and it was this knowledge that led him to seek answers as to why we experience these sufferings.

Although his quest took him six arduous years, his resolve was not shaken, and he finally did realize the answers to his questions and so much more.

It must be remembered that as a Buddha, Siddharta Gautama was under no obligation to teach. He could have spent the rest of his physical existence exploring his enlightenment not saying another word. I have been taught though that the essential elements of Enlightenment are infinite wisdom and boundless compassion that goes beyond anything we, as human beings, living the ordinary life, are capable of acquiring.

As a Buddha, I think having found his own answers, he became acutely aware of the sufferings of all human beings and that it was that boundless compassion that led him to turn the wheel of the dharma to help alleviate our suffering.

This is part of the process of awakening to gratitude which is so important to the life of a Shin Buddhist. To acknowledge gratefully our indebtedness to the Buddha and to all of life which sustains us. Namoamidabutsu Shaku Art Kaufmann

Looking for Rennyo Shonin and Meeting Gomonshu Kojun Ohtani

The beauty of Japan was on full display during our October 15-23, 2016 tour which was ponsored by the Bishop's Office to celebrate the new Monshu's promotion.



Starting in Nagoya with a visit to Yoshi-ko Umitani's family temple (Honshu-ji) in nearby Kameyama, we were greeted by many temple members and the entire Toro family. Honshu-ji is a beautiful temple originally built by Rennyo in 1468, re-built in 1611 and is in wonderful condition today. We were treated to a tea ceremony including delicious Japanese sweets, and sangha members presented each of us with beautiful handmade items. We had a very warm welcome from Yoshiko's entire



family: mother, Hatsuko; father, Rev. Shoshin; brother, Rev. Jitsudo; and sister, Keiko. Rev. Umitani's entire family (wife Yoshiko and daughters Naho and Riho) joined the tour in

Kameyama and Kyoto. The tour could not have started out in a better way for all of us!

On the way to Kyoto, we spent several days visiting other Rennyo and Jodo Shinshu locations in Takayama (Higashi Betsuin), Kanazawa (Kenrokuen Castle Park and Gassho Houses), and Yoshizaki Temple

(Rennyo's Hermitage); as well as an in-depth tour of the main Soto Zen seminary, Eihei-ji.

Kanazawa Castle Park is the center of the "the Peasant's Kingdom" where the Ikko-ikki sect (one of the original 10 Jodo Shinshu sects that developed after Shinran's death) established it own province in Kaga from 1488-1582 CE. Rennyo visited Kaga to re-connect with the Ikko-ikki

sect and to urge restraint while also teaching and attending to their needs.

The impressive "gassho houses" (A-frame, thatched roofs) of Shirakawa-go were lovely on a fine autumn day. It was a great opportunity to see a unique historical village where many Jodo Shinshu followers lived and shopped for local handcrafts.

Rennyo retreated to Yoshizaki after being threatened by Tendai warrior monks in 1471 and submitted by Dexter Mar

stayed there for about 4 years. He gained a following from the Ikko sect and brought them back into the mainstream Hongwanji. We were greeted at the current Yoshizaki Temple by an enthusiastic Shin priest who presented the history of Yoshizaki and then the group walked up the mountain to a hilltop park to see Rennyo's impressive statue and a scenic view of the area.

In Kyoto, we enjoyed the New Miyako Hotel across from the bustling Kyoto Train Station about a mile from the historic Nishi Hongwanji "mother" temple. What a comfortable hotel and convenient location!

To begin our Accession Ceremony Day, a special reception for international delegations was held for the Canadian, American and Hawaiian districts. Naho Umitani joined her dad, Rev. Toshiyuki, in expressing the Hawaii's delegation's warm Aloha and confidence in the new Monshu's leadership. Naho and Riho



later expressed their personal commitment to the Shin Buddhist path by participating in an affirmation ceremony and receiving their Buddhist names.

In the afternoon, we joined hundreds



of Hongwanji members from all over Japan and the world in the Amida and

the Founder's Halls for the Accession Service. This was literally an earth shaking event, as about 10 minutes into the ceremony a powerful (6.6) earth-quake occurred in Western Japan about 165 miles from Kyoto. The massive hanging lanterns swayed and the ceremony was stopped for 15 minutes

before starting over! How auspicious (though we know this was a natural coincidence)!

For those attending the March 2017 ceremony, we hope you have just as fantastic an experience as we did! Springtime in Kyoto will be beautiful!

The next day, our tour took a special trip to Mt. Hiei, where Shinran received his monastic Tendai training. We visited the Jogyo-do (the Hall of Constant Walking Meditation) where monks perform a 90-day walking meditation while chanting a 5-toned nembutsu. We were extraordi-

narily fortunate to enter and "walk in Shinran's steps" in a 2-minute version of the 90-day training! Our final day included a visit to Osaka Castle, to view Rennyo related areas such as the site of Rennyo's retirement hermitage, Ishiyama temple, upon which Osaka Castle was built after a 10-year battle with warlord, Oda Nobunaga.

Our tour group consisted of members from many Hawaii temples:



Betsuin (3), Moiliili (2), Makawao (2), Kamuela (2), Puna (1), HQ (4), Lihue (1), Waipahu (2). Revs. Umitani and Takahashi, plus the Kintetsu Travel Company provided a wonderfully informative and satisfying trip with good hotels and wonderful, delicious feasts! Namo Amida Butsu!!



The great practice is to say the Name of the Tathagata of unhindered light. This practice, comprehensively encompassing all practices, is perfect and most rapid in bringing them to fullness. For this reason, it is called "great practice." Saying the Name then breaks through all the ignorance of sentient beings and readily brings all their aspirations to fulfillment. Saying the Name is in itself mindfulness; mindfulness is nembutsu: nembutsu is Namo-amida-butsu.
